## The Metaphysics of Contingency: East and West

Since Plato and Confucius, the concept of contingency has figured in one form or another in philosophical traditions both east and west. Often a foil for its contrast term “necessity,” other times a supreme category of its own, contingency and its relation to metaphysics remains unclear and disputed. While most philosophers concede the contingency of historical events, of biological forms, and of individual existents, they display more caution on the question of the contingency of the world-universe itself. Is this a question for science? For theology? For metaphysics? What bearing does contemporary scientific cosmology have on metaphysics? Is a metaphysics of contingency defensible, or is it a contradiction in terms? Is the nature of contingency compatible with teleology in history, or in biology? Does contingency have a necessary shape, as argued by some process philosophers? Indeed, is a metaphysics of pure process intelligible? How is the concept of contingency theorized in the work of select philosophers, including Plato, Aristotle, Hegel, Hartshorne, Rorty, Meillassoux, Agamben, as well as Indian and Chinese philosophers? Proposals for papers on these and other related questions are welcomed, but other topics of metaphysics will also be considered.
